Dear Judge Korman:

Enclosed is a written proposal from Merkaz Vurke, which I respectfully request be included in the proposals being considered for Phase II distributions from the Swiss Banks Holocaust Victims Assets. For your background information, also enclosed is my previous submission on behalf of Merkaz Vurke which was a Memorandum of Suggestions for Allocation.

Due to recent newspaper publicity, I just became aware that a deadline had been set for proposals from organizations for distributions from the proceeds of the Holocaust Victims Assets Litigation. Although this is past the official date for proposals, I was never notified of the date although I had gone on record with Your Honor and with the Special Master requesting such notification. I therefore respectfully request that the proposal of Merkaz Vurke be given due consideration, and it not be prejudiced by this late filing.

For Your Honor's information, my requests to be notified were as follows:

- a. By letter dated September 5, 2001, I sent a letter to Your Honor requesting notification when the Court was ready to go into Phase II of this litigation. (A copy of my letter is enclosed).
- b. In November 2002, I telephoned Special Master Gribetz because I had learned of an article in a Lithuanian newspaper that indicated that the Special Master or the Court had begun giving funds to organizations from the settlement proceeds. Mr. Gribetz advised me that you were still in Phase I of the Swiss Banks settlement agreement and that you still did not know the amount of claims to bank accounts that will be made. He assured me that I would get notification when the Court was ready for Phase II. At Mr. Gribetz' request, after we spoke I faxed him the Lithuanian press article that I had referred to. (Enclosed is a copy of the article I faxed you with my cover sheet.)

Nevertheless, I was never notified either by the Court or the Special Master's office that the Court was ready to go into Phase II and was unaware of the filing deadline until last week, through a newspaper article.

The enclosed proposal was written by Merkaz Vurke in October 2003. It is a proposal for three grants, all of which would benefit needy Nazi survivors. The first grant is for \$60,000, the second for \$1.25 million, and the third for \$300,000.

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

Robert Kaufman of Manhattan, a former president of the New York City Bar Association and legislative assistant to Sen. Jacob Javits, confides that he was "totally amazed" after being notified recently that he would be receiving \$180,000 from his relatives' dormant ers have received their cheeks, Swiss bank deposits.

About a third of the money, some \$60,000, was wired to his bank account two weeks ago. But under a proposal made last week by the special master in the case, Judah Gribetz, Kaufman and other claimants would receive another one-third of the money up front; the remainder. would be paid once all claimants were assured of receiving their money. Those age 75 and older would receive the entire amount at once,

Gribetz also proposed that payments to slave laborers and Swiss refugees be increased by 45 percent. If approved, slave laborers, survivors of concentration camps and ghettos, would receive \$1,450 rather than the \$1,000 originally planned.

In addition, those who were admitted to Switzerland and then abused would receive \$725 instead of \$500, and those denied entry to Switzerland would receive \$3,625 instead of \$2,500.

matches to 36,000 dormant accounts posted by the Swiss banks on the Internet.

Those slave laborers and refugees who have already received their money would receive a supplemental check. Korman is expected to rule soon on the proposal.

MEMORANDUM OF SUGGESTIONS FOR ALLOCATION

The Jacob D. Fuchsberg Law Firm, as attorneys for Merkaz Vurke and on their behalf, respectfully submits this Memorandum of Suggestions Regarding the Plan of Allocation of the Holocaust Victims Assets Litigation.

Preamble

The allocation of the settlement funds from the Holocaust Victims Assets Litigation presents an historic opportunity to provide some measure of justice for victims of the Holocaust through monetary compensation to individual survivors and their progeny, and to community organizations that were an integral part of pre-war lewish life and themselves fell victim to the Holocaust.

While it is fair and equitable that the first people to be allocated monies under the terms of the Settlement Agreement should be those individuals or organizations who had actual funds on deposit with Settling Defendants' banks, or who are heirs of such depositors, it is apparent that after payment to these depositors and heirs, only a relatively small portion of the settlement will have been allocated.

Thus, the issue that needs to be addressed is how to allocate the remaining funds.

Speaking to this issue, I strongly recommend that organizations such as Merkaz Vurke be allocated a substantial portion of the settlement.

Organizations are as important as individuals, and ultimately settlement monies allocated to organizations who have lost assets in the Holocaust will not only compensate them for their past losses (including Deposited Assets, Looted Assets and Cloaked Assets), but also will enable them to continue their communal services for the progeny of the victims, as the victims themselves would have wanted, fostering continuity in Jewish life.

Merkaz Vurke --- Its Glorious Past in Poland

Merkaz Vurke a/k/a Merkaz Chasidei Vurke a/k/a the Vurke Organization (hereinafter "Merkaz Vurke"), was one of the largest active communal and religious organization existing in Poland for almost 160 years prior to World War II, comprising 120,000 -135,000 members who lived in approximately 150 towns in Poland.

Prior to World War II, Merkaz Vurke, whose headquarters were located at 41 Zamenhof Street in Warsaw, owned synagogues and other community buildings located in Warsaw and in the approximately 150 towns where its members lived.

Merkaz Vurke was established by followers (and descendants of followers) of the important 17-18th century Hasidic rabbi, Rabbi Yitzhak of Vurke, known as the 'Ohev Israel' (the one who loved the people). His son, the second Vurke Rabbi, is known as Mendel the Silent. Elie Wiesel recognized the significance of this legendary Rabbi in his book, "Souls on Fire". In his attempt to communicate the impact of this renowned Rebbe who withdrew into himself but influenced many, Wiesel hypothesized,

"Could he have foreseen that one hundred years after his retreat another fire would set the continent ablaze, and that its first victims would be Jewish men and women abandoned by God and by all mankind? Could it be that from that moment on he planned to fight fire with fire --- attempting to prepare us, demanding that we be strong, intransigent, capable of resisting evil no matter what form it takes, the comfort of faith included; capable of resisting even God and the hope in God?".

Wiesel, "Souls on Fire", p. 254, Random House, Inc., New York, 1972.

The Vurke organization itself was a victim of Nazi persecution. It lost the ownership and use of its synagogue buildings and community centers, its valuables (including religious articles and antiques) were looted, and it lost monies and investments that were in its own name as well as deposits and investments placed with leading individuals of the community on its behalf.

These losses were so extensive and damaging that the organization was forced to cease operations in Poland during the Holocaust and, thus, was unable to help its members at a time of extreme need. In all, approximately \$30,000,000 in assets was stolen or lost and claims will be made by Merkaz Vurke for these losses, which included Deposited Assets, Looted Assets and Cloaked Assets, as defined in the Settlement Agreement.

Merkaz Vurke --- Rebirth From the Flames, and Hopes For the Future

In defiance of the Nazi final solution, Merkaz Vurke is still in existence. Following the war, Merkaz Vurke was reconstituted in 1947. Survivors of the Vurke organization formed a religious corporation in the State of New York. In Israel the official name of the organization is "Mosdot Vurke", but is referred to in correspondence as Merkaz Vurke.

Today there are approximately 30,000 followers of Merkaz Vurke, approximately 20,000 in Israel and the U.S.A.; approximately 10,000 in Europe, South America, Canada and Australia.

Although the number of Merkaz Vurke's members today is a fraction of what it was in its heyday prior to World War II, its membership is growing as it succeeds in addressing the needs of its members and the Jewish communities in which they live by providing needed services and planning ahead for the future. For example, (a) in Israel Merkaz Vurke builds and helps administer synagogues, provides welfare benefits, health benefits, Jewish education, low-cost housing and financial services in the form of grants and no-interest loans for the needy; (b) in the U.S.A. Merkaz Vurke builds and helps administer synagogues and has plans for establishing a community center in New York City; (c) in Belgium, Venezuela, Costa Rica and Canada, Merkaz Vurke provides welfare benefits and financial services in the form of grants and no-interest loans for the needy.

Despite severe financial constraints, Merkaz Vurke in Israel has had the ability to acquire rights to use a large tract of land in Jerusalem owned by the State, with the hope of obtaining needed funds to establish a synagogue-center, school and multi-unit apartments.

If a substantial allocation is made to Merkaz Vurke from the Holocaust Victims settlement, it will enable this centuries-old organization to service its members as their ancestors who were murdered in the Holocaust would have wanted.

Conclusion

Allocating a substantial portion of the settlement to Merkaz Vurke and other organizations meeting similar criteria, rather than distributing directly to individuals, would serve four purposes:

- a) Have an immediate positive effect on thousands of people and their communities.
- b) Contribute to Jewish continuity by allocating funds to organizations which will enable their members to live as the Holocaust victims would have wanted their progency to live.
- c) Compensate an important segment of Polish Jewry and their spiritual followers for their devestating losses by providing now for present institutions and housing important to them and the continuity of their progeny.
- d) Simplify the distribution and administration of settlement funds to the recipients, with a concomitant decrease in transactional costs.
